This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.** 

# Homily

Advent 2020 is to me a particularly hard time for 'adulting' and staying calm & sane.

Granted, all those cancelled Christmas parties bring a certain relief, yet that is more than made for by the other facets of this pandemic. Watching rising infection numbers and feeling powerless, threatened and fragile is certainly taking a toll on me. Add the usual family craziness, the suffering of loved ones, all the politics

and a climate crisis into the mix, and you understand why the hope, peace, joy and love that the advent candles announce ring to my ears more like a mocking than an encouragement.

Yet, there is a small consolation in knowing that it's not just me, who is trying to keep the overwhelm at bay. Many struggle with the pandemic even more than I do: be it with social isolation, financial worries, sickness or death. Society has to deal with more than a virus, but also with a continuous spread of harmful ideologies and the effects of climate destruction seem to get out of control just as corona infection numbers are. There were always people who had a tough advent season, but this year it seems to be a much more universal experience.

Amongst all this mess, today's biblical protagonists take the stage.

Pregnant Mary's cheerfulness from our opening prayer seems a bit out of place when she sings: "my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour; He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, and has lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty."

## Enter Isaiah.

"he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."

Can his utopian vision cut through the apathy?

And finally, John the Baptist is rewarded by more booing than applause when he proclaims: "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord, (...)
Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me;"

Throughout centuries, Christians of many denominations have been challenged and encouraged by this Sunday's command to "Rejoice!". The call to 'Joy' is not a gentle suggestion, but a prescription. It is

echoed all through scripture and given center stage on this Third Sunday in Advent.

I guess we are all aware, that it's not just a happyclappy feeling, we are invited into here. Both bible commentaries and psychologists are describing joy as a feeling of delight or an exultation of the spirit arising from a sense of well-being or satisfaction. It is not depended on outer circumstances, but springs from within an individual.

Joy can grow in the gap between despair and happiness. Joy withstands the tension that exists in a world full of imperfection, yet is at the same time the dwelling place of Emmanuel – God With Us. Joy is a crucial building block of the Kingdom of God that is 'Already' and 'Not Yet'.

This morning we are called to cultivate joy as an act of worship. As much as God is the source of our rejoicing, he is also the recipient of it. Moreover, his joy enables us to brighten up the lives of those around us. Joy gives expression to God's presence in this world and it fuels us in our daily lives.

If you are one of the people that have found the doomand-gloom talk at the beginning exaggerated, then you might, in fact, be part of the rescue from joylessness in those around you. Be gentle with the broken-hearted, but don't be silenced. Be patient with the suffering, and faithfully join into Mary's song, continue Isaiah's vision casting and speak up as John the Baptist did.

Likewise, let the rest of us show grace towards those ridiculously cheerful ones. When we can't see the light at the end of the tunnel, sometimes all that's required of us is to surrender, and lean into the joy of others.

Following in the footsteps of our three bible characters, Christians have developed and used many other strategies to encounter God in their day-to-day, and thus nurse their joy back to health. Perhaps you and I can learn from them.

One strategy is sharing life with others, be it in communal worship or prayer, acts of service or fellowship around the table or elsewhere.

Then there is individual prayer.

Many people aslo find spiritual practices to be very effective at fostering joy in the everyday: things like meditation and contemplation, but also activities such as painting, cycling or gardening.

Maybe some of you are more the musical type and find nothing more soothing than a choral piece, worship music or the sound of that cheesy Christmas pop song that never ceases to bring a smile to your face. Please feel encouraged to explore and lean into the tools you find most helpful. It's time well invested. Trust in the process and keep your eyes, ears and hearts open to catch that gentle flicker of joy in yourself and in those around you.

Imagine what the next few weeks and the rest of this long corona-winter would look and feel like if we would take the command "Rejoice!!!" to heart. Each of us would be able to spread hope in this polarised and exhausted world and would, in turn, have others to lean on when the going gets tough. May we all nurture joy in our communities and in ourselves during this ongoing time of advent – the time of waiting for The Christ.


Merciful Father, accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.
