Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

Homily

I want to focus today on the Gospel text, which might be more or less known to you and one that is near and dear to my heart, one that influenced me to come to Freiburg 16 years ago, calling me to make disciples amongst college students and one that continually both challenges and comforts me.

These are the Jesus' last words to His disciples before He ascended into heaven to be with His and our Father. These are Jesus' famous last words, if you will. Is the German phrase, "Das Beste kommt zum Schluss" (the best comes at the end) also true here? If you are unsure now, you can tell me after the service... and after we have looked at them a bit.

So what do these famous last words say? I can't give you a complete answer, partially because I feel like these few sentences are not enough to go by. Please permit me a slight sidetrack to talk about communication and meaning. Perspective, context and audience play an incredible role here and in all communication. Did you know that research shows that words alone (without body language or tone) carry only 10% of a message's meaning? The majority of what we communicate is "said" through our body language (55%) and our tone (10%). This can be both harmful and helpful. Who besides me has written an email quickly and sent it without rereading it and finds out the mail's recipient ends up totally misinterpreting your message and writes back in unnecessary frustration? Or...I know in my early days of learning German I was super grateful that I could somehow manage to get my point across to the baker or the taxi driver by just pointing a finger and/or acting out what I needed!

Over the years I have actually understood this passage in variety of ways—impacted by upbringing, church background, teaching, etc. Maybe you have too? It is unfortunate that we don't have a video recording of Jesus saying these last words where we could observe His body language and hear the tone and volume of His voice. That would definitely help in understanding the message. (And, although you can watch countless movies about Jesus' life, I am not sure which one would be the most accurate interpretation of this scene.)

Jesus' tone has varied in my mind from time to time, which has strongly influenced how I've interpreted these verses. How do you hear the words, "Go, therefore, and make disciples?" (How was it read just a few minutes ago?) Is it with a strong commanding and controlling voice, like the German title of the verses "der Missionsbefehl" (the command to missions). Is there an accompanying index finger calling the disciples to hurry up and go (or else)? If so, I imagine the disciples reacting more out of fear and trepidation.

Or...could it have been more of a strong but softer voice saying, "Go," with a smile on his face and open arms, as a response to Jesus seeing His disciples bubbling over with so much excitement and energy like kids who struggle to sit still on Christmas morning, eager to hand out the presents they have made for their families or who come home from school with the latest and most exciting news and are dying to share the news with others. Could he have had tears in His eyes, knowing that His time on Earth (for now) was over and that the side-by-side ministry how they had been doing it would end and He'd be ascending to heaven? This version corresponds more with the "Great Commission," an English title given to the passage.

I definitely don't claim to know which of the two scenarios is closer to the truth and, who knows, it could actually be something totally different. Another way to better understand this passage is to look at WHO is saying it—the messenger. Our picture of Jesus (and God) strongly influences how we hear and see this scene and understand the spoken imperative. Close your eyes. What does Jesus look like? (and here I don't necessarily mean, what color of hair, eyes, skin does he have, etc.) Is he wagging his index finger at you and commanding you to do something? Is he coming running towards you like the father in the parable of the prodigal son? Is it something completely different? Or do you see nothing at all?

It is so important to know WHO is speaking to us. Let's look at today's other readings to see what hints they give us. They provide descriptions of God, but because Jesus is also completely God, we can connect these words with Him as well.

Both Psalms—29 and 95 (go back to the slides) describe God's incomparable power, glory, strength, honor, and greatness. This can paint a very intimidating picture…like a super hero or perhaps some could see him as a villain to be scared of IF you didn't see the other aspect mentioned in Psalm 95 "the flock under His care." This aspect is more clearly described in the

words of Psalm 23, "The Lord is our Shepherd." Additionally, God is described as the "rock of our salvation," meaning our support, the one who forgives us from all our sins and makes it possible for us to be with Him.

How does this help us interpret Jesus' famous last words? With the description of God's voice as one that is like a flash of lightening and the description of his might, I can see how one might picture a somewhat harsh and commanding Jesus proclaiming, "Go..." At the same time, there is also evidence of a gentler and more shepherding Jesus.

I personally grew up imagining God and Jesus more as being far away yet loving and even remember once, as a child, laying on the grass in our front yard, looking up at the sky and imagining seeing Jesus sitting on His heavenly throne. Then, in my teenage years, I had a phase where I thought God was irrelevant, distant, and even questioned if he really cared about what was happening with me and my family.

That view changed after I had a life-threatening accident where I met Jesus in a very personal way. I sensed His deep and unconditional love for me and his desire for me not just to DO things for Him and to be a good person but more than everything else to be in a relationship with me. What an incredible blessing and an amazing gift!

So... back to the Gospel. I can't paint an exact picture of the scene, but I do know that Jesus calls us to go and make disciples—to tell people the good news of an unconditionally loving and all-powerful God, who longs to have a relationship with His children, who forgives ALL our sins and promises a life abundantly!

These truths are incomparable to the offers this world can give us! They are one-of-a-kind, unsurpassable. It's mind-boggling that the creator of the Earth, an all-powerful God, the KING (since it's Christ the King Sunday) wants to have a relationship with me. AND, what's more, He even promises in the last sentence of the passage, "and surely, I am with you always, to the

end of the age!" He is not only somethings there...a friend or companion when it fits His busy schedule, but HE is always there!!

If this is all true, then shouldn't we be fidgety like the anxious children I mentioned before, dying to share the good news or pass out the special gift? Maybe you are! If so, that's great! GO!! And share the good news!

If you are not, then welcome to the club! I have often lacked the passion or felt distant to the truths that God offers. So, what do we do? There is no fine print in the Bible that says, "Go ...when you feel like it or if you want to or Go if you are a missionary or a pastor. It does say, though, to "make disciples of all nations" and there I would take the literary freedom to say that each one of us is included in the ALL part.

If we are not experiencing or lacking in understanding of the Gospel, if Jesus feels distant and we can't sense that He is with us, then the great commission starts with us in our own hearts. I know most of us haven't been on a plane in some time, but can you dig out the memory of the security announcement pre-takeoff? What should you do first with the oxygen masks if the cabin pressure changes? You should first put the mask on yourself before helping others, right?

It is the same way with our faith. The good news of the Gospel first needs to be understood and experienced by us before we pass it on to others. (It is possible to do so without fully understanding and experiencing it for a short time, but I think you would quickly burn out in doing it that way and, besides that, you would miss out on the whole relational aspect of really experiencing God going with you.

So, what picture do you have of Jesus and the Gospel scene now? Has it changed? Is it more vivid? Can you better imagine Jesus saying His last words to His disciples?

May I suggest the following next steps...

- 1. For all of us who have a muddled view of God and Jesus....spend time in prayer and ask Him to reveal Himself to you. Wait expectantly for Him. Rev. 3:20 says, "Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with him and he with me."
- 2. For those of us who know in our heads the Gospel truths mentioned but have lost the excitement for sharing it, let's pray that the Holy Spirit, God in us, would give light the fire of passion for Him within us, giving us boldness and courage to GO!

And...when we finally do GO, it doesn't have to be across the world or even across town. It can be going to our family or our friends, to whomever God puts on our heart. And...we don't need to worry about WHAT to say or how to say it because God promises to give us the words we need. Just share what you have experienced with Jesus. Tell them that they have a GOD that LOVES them so much and wants to have a relationship with them.

And...know in and through it all HE is with us...even to the end of the age.
