Let us prepare ourselves for the word of God **Our hearts and our minds are open**

But when the set time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those under the law, that we might receive adoption to sonship. Because you are his sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, *"Abba*, Father." So you are no longer a slave, but God's child; and since you are his child, God has made you also an heir.

This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

The reading is taken from Luke 2:15-21

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke

Glory to you, O Lord

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.

On the eighth day, when it was time to circumcise the child, he was named Jesus, the name the angel had given him before he was conceived.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

Homily

To begin I have a little confession to make. Having been part of the Roots & Shoots evenings with Bishop Trevor I was blessed with some (at least for me) new insights about the "Our Father"

- this quite short, unpretentious and in its modest simplicity seemingly simple-minded prayer that Jesus gave to his disciples when they asked him: "Lord, teach us to pray!" (Luke 11:1).

I knew I would lead the service at the end of the year and thought that would be a good opportunity to dig in deeper and read Helmut Thielicke's book bishop Trevor had recommended to us: "The Prayer That Spans the World: Sermons on the Lord's Prayer" but how on earth would I span the divide between the readings and this topic?

A little tense I checked today's readings and happily read:

Because you are sons and daughters, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba, Father!" (Galatians 4:6 CEB)

Grateful I had read Thielicke's book I prepared today's meditation dealing with the Our Father's beginning that tries to convey a few of his thoughts combined with what we talked about at Roots & Shoots.

Our Father in heaven,

In the Greek version "Pater" is the first word that in the everyday Aramaic that Jesus spoke would be "Abba" which is "Daddy" in English and not the more formal "Father". You quickly see that we can only say "Daddy" if there is already a relationship. Jesus the Christ takes us as his sisters and brothers into his relationship with the one to whom the psalmist sings you "created my innermost parts; you knit me together while I was still in my mother's womb." (Psalm 139:13) Jesus the Way spans the gap that divided us from God.

"Daddy" is not said in the formality of an official letter, it's rather used in an informal telephone call that begins with "Hi, it's me!" knowing that the other will recognise your voice because he has called you first and is waiting for you.

It's the answering "Speak, for your servant is listening." that Eli teaches to Samuel when the Lord calls him. (1 Samuel 3:10b).

It's the trusting "Here I am, a total mess!" that's handed down to us by Mother Mary Clare of the Sisters of the Love of God. This is a Church of England Community in Oxford.

Or - as today's reading says: It's Jesus' spirit in our deepest centre, crying "Abba, Father!"

And that he is "in heaven" - does this mean that he is far away from us here on earth? The opposite is true: The heavenly God is unique and so much more than an earthly parent could ever be. "In heaven" says to me: Be careful never to confuse your images with godly reality. Be aware that you will never be able to grasp God's powerful love and merciful power. Solomon prayed thousands of years ago: "In truth, the heavens, even the highest heaven, cannot contain you." (1 Kings 8:27 EHV).

God provided the best image of him himself: Currently we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. And he - the Immanuel - is with us everywhere, always, "until the end of the world" (Matthew 28:20 CEV).

hallowed be your name, ...

Biblically speaking a name is part of a person or a thing. It reveals one's secret, shows your nature and essence, gives you your identity. God's name is deeply linked with him himself. It dwells within the temple in Jerusalem (Deuteronomy 12:11) where God reveals himself to his people.

God lets Moses explain to Aaron and his sons that when they issue the blessing "they will put my name on the Israelites, and I will bless them". (Numbers 6:27) Therefore we are told to deal reverently with God's name: "You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God." (Exodus 20:07) The only adequate answer to this name is an attitude of awe.

But there is yet another layer to it. Brother John of Taizé writes in his book about the Ten Commandments:

"those called by God misuse his Name when their way of life is not in harmony with the faith they profess. That is why, at the beginning of the prayer Jesus taught his disciples, he tells them to pray that God's Name be made holy (Matthew 6:9]. In other words, the Lord's Prayer asks that all may discover God's true identity through the lives of those who have been touched by him and who have set out on the road of discipleship. To the extent that they allow God to shine forth in their lives, they communicate his true Name to others."

How devastating if we really let this thought touch our heart!

Forward-looking to the next line it's almost impossible to fail to hear John the Baptist's voice: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." (Matthew 3:2) Only if we are honest with ourselves do we appreciate that it is the father whom we depend on, the son who showed us the way back and walks every step with us.

Jesus guides our gaze away from ourselves to the father: "Not I, but your name be hallowed!" "Hallowed be your name" means now: Abba, I will trust you. I will believe that nothing and no-one "will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:39b)

Let me end with St. John Climacus who said beautifully: "To repent is not to look downwards at my own shortcomings, but upwards at God's love. It is not to look backwards with self-reproach but forward with trustfulness. It is to see not what I have failed to be, but what by the grace of Christ I might yet become. Amen.
